

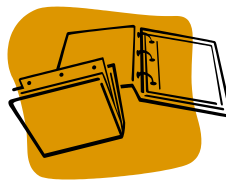


General School Supply List

Individual teachers will inform students of other specific items needed for each class. The following is a general list of basic supplies that every student should have. These items should be brought to school as needed.

1. Loose leaf paper (several reams)
2. Blue and black pens (many)
3. # 2 pencils (many)
4. Highlighters (4 colors)
5. 3" x 5" Index cards (Start with 100)
6. Colored pencils
7. Colored markers
8. 1" binders (3)
9. 1/2" binders (3)
10. Subject divider tabs (several sets)
11. Several 70 page spiral notebooks (there are nine subjects)
12. Pocket folders – plain in basic colors
13. RW CD's or a USB drive to save and carry work back and forth
14. A scientific or graphing calculator
 - Calculators:
 -  TI-30XA or TI 30X 115 for Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry, College Algebra
 -  TI-83 Plus for Physics and Calculus (Graphing calculator)
15. A bible which **must be** purchased from the business office (Freshmen/Transfers only)
16. Seven Habits Book purchased from our business office (Freshmen only)



The following items should be purchased and kept at home until needed.

1. Poster boards (start with 3 – There is nothing worse than coming home from a hard day at work, trying to relax, and having your child tell you at 9:30 p.m. that he/she needs a poster board for a project the next day. Having some already at home will be a life and temper-saver.)
2. A ruler or yardstick (Standard English & Metric rule)
3. Glue, tape and/or glue gun
4. Construction paper or colored paper
5. Plain white computer paper
